



Fact Sheet: America Needs An Attorney General, Not Another Trump Consigliere

Todd Blanche Still Behaves Like Trump's Defense Attorney, Using DOJ To Go After the President's Enemies and Reward His Cronies and Foot Soldiers:

1. Blanche used his authority as Acting Attorney General (AG) to give Trump, his family, and all of their businesses a "[Super Pardon](#)" that protects them for life from *any* investigation, audit, lawsuit, or prosecution by *any* federal agency for *any* violation of federal law.
2. As Acting AG, Blanche entered into a "settlement" agreement with the President and created a \$1.8 billion taxpayer-funded slush fund for J6 cop-beaters and other MAGA foot soldiers. In response to bipartisan outrage, Blanche has tried to claim the \$1.8 billion slush fund will not move forward. His refusal to rescind the terms of the settlement agreement in writing has been [called out](#) by federal judges and Members of Congress of both parties.
3. Blanche has been responsible for the handling of the Epstein files "[from the beginning](#)," according to former AG Pam Bondi. He is responsible for the publication of survivors' names and the continued cover-up, redaction, and wholesale withholding of millions of pages from release, including documents implicating Trump, in clear violation of the bipartisan Epstein Files Transparency Act. He also authorized the publication of a July 2025 memo falsely claiming the files do not include any evidence warranting investigation into any additional perpetrators.
4. In violation of Bureau of Prisons policies regarding sexual offenders, [Blanche transferred convicted child sex trafficker](#) Ghislaine Maxwell to a cushy, minimum-security prison camp known as "Club Fed," where she has received [preferential treatment](#).
5. Blanche moved to [vacate the seditious conspiracy convictions](#) of the [Proud Boys and Oath Keepers](#) leaders that even Trump didn't pardon.
6. Blanche [fired](#) experienced U.S. attorneys and [fought](#) the courts to install Trump's handpicked prosecutors.
7. During Blanche's tenure, the DOJ abruptly terminated more than [300 critical public safety and crime prevention grants](#) awarded to 221 organizations across 37 states, cutting funding for programs supporting state and local law enforcement and providing services to crime victims and survivors.

8. Blanche pursued [aggressive DOJ investigations](#) into reporters, sending armed federal agents to serve [unprecedented subpoenas](#) at their homes in an effort to compel them to reveal their sources for stories critical of the Administration.
9. Blanche [stymied](#) investigations into the murders of Renée Good and Alex Pretti, who were shot and killed by DHS officers.
10. Blanche secured a bogus [indictment](#) of Trump’s foe, former FBI Director James Comey, for posting photos of seashells, alongside other baseless political persecutions.
11. Blanche [rushed](#) a sham [indictment](#) against the Southern Poverty Law Center (SPLC), then lied about SPLC’s longstanding practice of sharing information with the FBI.
12. Blanche [shut down an investigation](#) into Trump’s “Border Czar” Tom Homan for pocketing a \$50,000 cash bribe.
13. Blanche continues to withhold Volume Two of Special Counsel Jack Smith’s report regarding the [investigation](#) into Trump’s efforts to steal classified documents, hoard them in the ballrooms and bathrooms of Mar-a-Lago, show them off to foreign visitors and donors, and then defy subpoenas, conceal documents, and delete security footage to obstruct justice.
14. Blanche [fired](#) former DOJ Pardon Attorney Liz Oyer for refusing to restore the gun rights of convicted domestic abuser and Trump friend Mel Gibson, then dispatched two armed U.S. Marshals to Oyer’s house to [discourage her from testifying](#) to Congress.
15. Under Blanche’s leadership, DOJ has [routinely lied](#) to federal judges and defied court orders. In hundreds of cases around the country, federal judges—appointed by Democrats and Republicans—have sounded the alarm about DOJ’s lawless disregard for the judicial process.
